To prevent it from becoming an all-out plague we need to follow the regulations, ordinances, rules and advice we have been handed. It's a bitter pill to swallow but it's the best we've got.

For our part we just spent an entire year, unable to tend to our needy members or meet our new Rabbi and Educator face to face. Unable to unroll our Torah scrolls to the applicable portion for our services. Unable to break bread or bless wine with our friends. Unable to hold a Passover Seder. It's enough to make a person crack. But we don't. Because we know better.

How I wish that were true of everyone in our community. Unfortunately, there are glaring examples before us. As much as we would like to, some of them cannot be ignored.

I am thinking particularly about Randy Hillier, MPP - Lanark-Frontenac-Kingston. Recently, Mr. Hillier, an elected official, whose strong anti-lockdown, antimask, and pro-gathering opinions and agenda are already well known and publicized under the hashtags #WeAreLivingaLie and #nomorelockdowns, invoked the unthinkable. He likened the Ontario government's latest lockdown to the holocaust. He used social media to post a picture of Adolf Hitler looking over Nazi followers with the caption, "THE THIRD WAVE."

This made National news. Locally, The Kingston Whig Standard newspaper reporter Meghan Balogh reached out to members of the Kingston Jewish Community for comment. Fortunately, for her, she was able to reach the Chair of the Kingston Jewish Council for some very eloquent comment on the matter. She also asked me for comment. To be honest, words failed me. Hillier is as in genuine and coarse as they come. His commentary is more suited to suppression. I'd expect to find it in the flame-warladen comment gallery of an obscure social media page, more than in an official Tweet or a widely-circulated media publication.

The ugly principle of Godwin's law applies. A lazy tactless doctrine of behavior. Any argument, especially online, if it becomes heated enough will probably invoke a comparison of one side or another to Hitler

and the Nazis. Hillier cannot be made to understand how hurtful his decision to resort to this lower-rung path of least resistance is. He does it so thoughtlessly. Not like a deliberate hatemonger who seeks to hurt a target. Just the same, it's a slap in the face from a lazy, thoughtless bag of wind.

KJC found the words that failed me. "Abhorrent", for example. Naturally appalled, as I am sure we all were, at his invoking the genocide of six million Jews and millions more people in response to Ontario's life-preserving and health-protection measures. We agreed that this was an obvious sign of Hillier's insensitivity and ignorance. A slap in the face to the victims and currently living survivors. That he is in need of education and enlightment whether he knows it or not. And if he is educated, he should be ashamed. This lockdown does not compare, in any way to the history and events of the Holocaust.

I'd also said it would be nice if we all had the prerogative to not have to take Hillier seriously. But we have no choice. His voice is heard from the platform of public office. It carries weight. It influences the thinking of our fellow people, for good or bad. We have no choice but to acknowledge that it has been said so we can publically respond in a meaningful way. This unfortunately gives rise to repeating his ridiculous claims. What a shame.

He does not represent the values or needs of the community he was elected to serve. We should all now see him for what he is. We can and should look right through him. There is nothing there. I would be very happy to see him go away now.

Again, we should remind ourselves. None of us like what is happening to us. But we are resigned to understand and do the right thing. To make the best of it -- sacrifices and all, and take measures to ensure we preserve life, protect health, and support the common good. We can be smart, aware and true to ourselves at the same time. There is no sense in fighting it and certainly no need to resort to polemic.

I look forward to the end of this and to seeing all of you in good health in good time.
